

Stony Pt Aug 1852

Dear Father I

Received your favour of the 17<sup>th</sup> Dec and not having any thing of interest to communicate have delayed writing till now, and not being any more off and perhaps never will be in that respect think it best to wait no longer I was happy in hearing of the good health of my friends and their prosperity there seems to be some anxiety on your part to have me come home with my Family to Nagshead Co- perhaps if I was alone off here I might conclude to come back but I am looking ahead to the time when my Children shall have become of age and want some little start in the world that is one thing that prevents me to suffer deprivation and endure hardships patiently and having a desire to experience and know some things for my self that are transpiring in the world I prefer not to stay in one place any longer than the prospect bids fair of doing something for my self and family we fair to run some risk in order to gain very much even of the wealth of this world I wound up my business in the merchending rather sudden and unexpected to all but myself altho I had concluded to do so some time previous seeing how things were going I thought best to do so not exactly breaking down for I have paid all my debts of my own contracting to the satisfaction of my Creditors and got a plenty of the yellowlopes on hand the little quaker thought to ought wit me and was laying his plans, to do the same I rather gess he will get caught in his own snare he has proved himself to be the quaker whoes Mother told to get it my job- I gess if he gets what belongs to me I will be any how

 it will come to this place all are wide awake  
 in reference to it but myself I calculate  
 to keep cool, I am not fully determined at present  
 what to engage in this summer probably

 in reference to it we are all well at  
 present and probably as well or better  
 off than when we came here nothing as yet
