

Tonawanda Feb 11. 1857

My Dear Grand Pa.

I thought as I had a few leisure moments, I would answer you by writing to you. Pa received a letter from you a short time ago, and commenced answering it but finally concluded not to send it. he does not get much time to write he is very busy in the evening. you spoke in your letter about what you heard in regard to his drinking and getting a divorce from my step mother. I don't think Pa has had such an idea about it, for Pa has trouble enough now. I am not sure if it will turn out right in the end. we have very high wind to day and very heavy thunder snow but we which is very uncommon for winter. some people cold weather for about three or

you can't think you can't so well  
four weeks longer I am in hope  
as will for I would like to have it  
now I have not had but one day-  
side this winter and that was rather a  
poor one at that we have had two  
locations since you was here one for  
the benefit of Mr. McNeil and the other  
for the presbyterian preacher Mr. Collog.  
Our singing school was not last one  
one night longer than we are to serve  
a public rehearsal, there has been two  
deaths within two weeks or a night or so.  
one was Mr. Franklins Wierens wife which  
I suppose you remember she died of the  
consumption, the other was a widow lady  
by the name of Dyer, she left an  
orphan to mourn her loss, whom the  
people sympathize with; she left property  
enough to support her and has friends  
to take care of her, which is a great  
blessing to her, but after all she has  
lost a great friend

Should you wish to see my book  
I can take it out for you soon so  
Dr. Deane will find it very interesting  
we are afraid Mr. Chamberlain will  
go next; he will be surprised very much  
here. Oh! don't forget for you remember that  
man that was boasting with us when  
you was here he boarded here about a  
week after you went away within that  
time he attended church and prayer  
meeting very steady and seemed to be  
trying to be a good man and often  
spoke of you, he has now left the place  
he was to work at and gone to Abing.

I received a letter from Aunt Emily  
a short time ago and was very glad to  
hear from her she wrote a real good letter  
Willy and I send their love and be-  
lieves to you and all the rest. I want  
close for I don't think of any thing more  
of any consequence to write.
