Dear Father,

Your letter of last month is received, I am glad to learn by it that you are still in comfortable health & able to labor for the spiritual interests of those with whom you may come in contact. There has been a protracted meeting here in the neighborhood of late. - no conversions; but the Church were shaken up, & doubtless some good accomplished in that respect.

We are all in usual health this winter. Have had rather a mild winter for this locality so far, but a very slight sprinkling of snow a few times, & bare ground most of the time, up to the 1st day of this month. Since which we have had about $\frac{1}{2}$ a foot of snow.

The State Legislature are now agitating a Bill which will likely be passed; to compell people to take care of their own cattle & make the owners liable for all damage done by them on other peoples land. Should this become a law, there will be a tremendous amount of grain raised in this part of the State where it is principally Prairie. As only a little land will need to be fenced for pasturing, & the balance can be used for meadow, & grain without the expense of fencing, which is quite an item, especially on the Prairie.

I have not heard of any person freezing to death
in this State this Winter so far. but now & then
a sore nose to be put with, showing that there has
been some frosty weather. It usually breaks up
here about the middle of March. Not having
snow the fore part it will make the Winter seem
quite short. A mild Winter, will likely help to
increase the emigration to this State next
Season. A large emigration is expected by a
good many.
